




### Priority Areas

- Behavioral Health
- Housing

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


# OPERATIONALIZING THE CHIP: INVESTMENTS & OUTCOMES

\$10.8 M in funding was awarded to 36 community programs that address at least one of the 5 CHIP priorities and one of the 28 CHIP strategies. **Over 42%** of that funding has been awarded to strategies that address NOAA recommendations.

This unprecedented alignment across multiple funding streams (MSA, MHSA, OSF), county agencies, and community non-profit partners maximizes our **collective impact and ability to advance health and well-being in Napa County.**

**Goal 2:** Prevent and effectively treat substance use disorders and harmful use of substances such as tobacco and alcohol.

**Objective 2.1:** Increase access to prevention and treatment resources for opioid use disorder.

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


# SUBSTANCE USE NAVIGATOR (SUN) PROGRAM IN THE ED

- 27% increase in number of patients diagnosed with an OUD that are prescribed MAT in the ED.
- 97 patients diagnosed with an OUD were prescribed MAT in the ED.
- 633 connections made by SUN, providing education and resources for SUD and OUD services available throughout Napa County to hospital caregivers, patients, and family members.
